#### CELEBRATING CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH-DENILLE FRANCIS

Joy and happiness, a time of wonder and discovery. Every child's life should be filled with such magic. April is National Child Abuse Prevention month, and the 2012 theme is "Every Child Counts! Know them, Nurture them, Protect them!" The national Pinwheels for Prevention campaign uses shiny silver and blue pinwheels to symbolize the hope and joy of childhood. The pinwheels are used as a reminder that prevention works, and it "shouldn't hurt to be a child."

The Pinwheels for Prevention campaign is a sign of hope, while the widely recognized Blue Ribbon Campaign honors those already impacted by child abuse. The national Blue Ribbon Campaign was started in Virginia in 1989 by a grandmother grieving the loss of her 3-year-old grandson who was murdered by his mother's boyfriend.

Across Virginia 49,619 reports of possible abuse were made last year; 717 of which were made in York County; 93 investigated cases of abuse were founded in the county. In the state last year, 31 children died (26 under the age of 4) as a result of abuse and neglect, including one child who lived in York County. Abuse and neglect affects all eco-



nomic, racial, social, ethnic, and religious groups.

Abuse can be committed by people we least expect; they are friends, neighbors, and relatives. Child abuse can happen when ordinary people are caught in life situations beyond their control and cannot access needed skills or supports to cope. Stress, social isolation, inexperience with children, unrealistic expectations, drug and alcohol problems, unmet emotional needs and unaddressed histories of trauma can all contribute to child abuse. The next time you see an exhausted parent struggling with a difficult parenting moment, (moments we ALL experience as parents) you can offer support with a simple statement like. "Parenting is so exhausting sometimes" or "It's so hard to wait in line". Comments that let the parent know they aren't alone, while avoiding blame or humiliation. may be the support

needed to prevent a parent from crossing the fine line between discipline and abuse. Blaming a parent, or creating a situation where a parent is humiliated, creates greater risk for the child later on.

Moments in Virginia: Every 4 hours a family seeks shelter for domestic violence but is denied due to lack of space. Every 86 minutes a child is abused or neglected. Every 12 days a child dies from abuse or neglect. At any given moment, there is an average of 5,204 children in foster care.

Prevention saves lives, preserves families, strengthens communities, and is the only approach proven to prevent child abuse. In honor of National Child Abuse Prevention Month, Tabb Lakes Homes Association partnered with the York-Poquoson Child Advocacy Team (our local volunteer non-profit chapter of Prevent Child Abuse Virginia) to be-

come the first neighborhood in York County to embrace the Pinwheels for Prevention campaign. The Tabb Lakes Homes Association granted permission for a pinwheel garden to be planted at the base of the neighborhood sign on route 134. Similar gardens have been planted across the community and nation. The metallic blue pinwheel gardens are reminders of the joy of childhood, a reminder to celebrate childhood and nurture and protect each and every child.

Our Tabb Lakes Pinwheel garden, however, vanished 3 days after the children planted it (sometime after 9:00 AM on Tuesday, April 10th). The 75 pinwheels, valued at \$1.00 each, were property of the York-Poquoson Child Advocacy Team and purchased from Prevent Child Abuse America with donated money from private citizens supporting the campaign locally. We do not suspect malice was involved in the removal of the pinwheel garden, due to the time of day and quick methodical removal. We imagine someone may have removed them with good intentions, not realizing what the garden was. They can be replanted or dropped off anytime at 127 Tiger Paw Path with no questions asked.

# 2012 Hurricane Season Expected to be Less Active

Colorado State University's 2012 Atlantic hurricane season prediction calls for below average activity with 10 named storms of which four would be hurricanes, and two major hurricanes (Cat 3-5). CSU's report states there is a 42 percent chance that at least one major hurricane will make landfall on the U.S. coastline. Hurricane season begins June 1 and lasts until November 30.

#### Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Alarms – Your First Defense

U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) issued a report examining the characteristics of civilian fire fatalities in residential buildings. The report is titled "Civilian Fire Fatalities in Residential Buildings (2008-2010)"

- Fifty percent of civilian fire fatalities in residential buildings occur between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. This period also accounts for 47 percent of fatal fires.
- Bedrooms (55 percent) are the leading location where civilian fire fatalities occur in residential buildings.
- Ninety-two percent of all civilian fatalities in residential building

- fires involve thermal burns and smoke inhalation.
- Thirty-six percent of fire victims in residential buildings were trying to escape at the time of their deaths; an additional 35 percent were sleeping.
- "Other unintentionally set, careless" actions and "smoking" (each accounting for 16 percent) are the leading causes of fatal residential building fires.
- Males accounted for 57 percent of civilian fire fatalities in residential buildings; women accounted for 43 percent of the fatalities.
- Approximately 44
   percent of civilian
   fatalities in residential building fires are
   between the ages of
   40 and 69.
- Thirteen percent of civilian fire fatalities in residential buildings were less than 10 years old.
- Appliance fires produced 1,351 fatalities per 1,000 fatal fires, the largest number of fatalities per 1.000 fatal fires.

Checking your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and changing the batteries is one of the simplest things you can do to protect your family. Alarms are only good for 10 years. That includes the hard wired alarms in our homes. Replace them if they are out of date, even if the alarm works, because the sensors may not function as well as a new one. Ensure you test them regularly. The "Change Your Clock - Change Your Battery" program urges everyone to adopt the habit of changing smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarm batteries when changing clocks, which could make the difference in surviving a fire in your home. #### MOSQUITO SEASON IS COMING! - TOM GALLAGHER



An early mosquito season is on the horizon as we've

had one of the warmest winters in years which may lead to a mosquito bonanza outbreak over the next few weeks. Mosquitoes hibernate during the cold months, but this winter has been anything but typical. They may well be emerging from their hiding places much earlier than expected in search of plant food from flowers and vegetation. The mosquito infestation all hinges on the amount of standing water and its temperature for their development. It could therefore be a banner year for mosquitoes.

In York County we live in a mosquito enriched

environment due to the many miles of fresh and salt marsh breeding opportunities. In essence, there is no such thing as

"mosquito free environment" in the county. To reduce their number, mosquito control utilizes an integrated management program that focuses on breeding habitats along with control of adult flying mosquitoes. We take proactive measures in stocking mosquito fish and/or biologically treat all known BMP ponds and other areas that breed mosquitoes. In essence, we start below and finish above for effective prevention.

As you may know, we had a "Mosquito Control Needs Your Help" article
