#### WINTER WEATHER HEATING SAFETY TIPS — LOU LAFRENAYE

As winter weather moves in, many people use fireplaces, space heaters, and other fuel-fired equipment to warm their homes. While alternative heating sources can make your home cozy, using them increases your risk of a home fire.

According to the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), heating is the second leading cause of home fires following cooking.

- From 2008-2010, an average of 50,100 home heating fires occurred in the United States each year and resulted in an annual average of approximately 150 deaths, 575 injuries and \$326 million in property loss.
- Heating was the second leading cause of home fires following cooking.
- Home heating fires peaked in the early evening hours between 5 and 9 p.m. with the highest peak between 6 and 8 p.m. This four hour period accounted for 30 percent of all home heating fires.
- Home heating fires peaked in January (21 percent) and declined to the lowest point during the summer months from June to August.
- Confined fires, those fires confined to chimneys, flues or fuel burners, ac-

- counted for 87 percent of home heating fires.
- Thirty percent of the nonconfined home heating fires occurred because the heat source was too close to things that can burn.



Taking simple steps can prevent a fire from happening in your home. The National Fire Protection Association and USFA offer these heating safety tips, including:

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from a fireplace, wood stove, or space heater;
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room;
- Have your fireplace chimney properly inspected for cracks and creosote buildup.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuelburning space heaters; and

 Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.

# HOLIDAY SAFETY REMINDERS—YORK COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF FIRE AND LIFE SAFETY

The holiday season is upon us again, which means many of us are scrambling to decorate and tidy our homes for gettogethers with families and friends for holiday celebrations. It also means more cooking, home decorating, entertaining, and an increased risk of fire due to heating equipment. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA):

- U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated annual average of 240 home structure fires that began with Christmas trees in 2005-2009. These fires caused an annual average of 13 civilian fire deaths, 27 civilian fire injuries and \$16.7 million in direct property damage.
- On average, one of every

- 18 reported home Christmas tree fires resulted in a death, compared to an average of one death per 141 total reported home fires.
- Forty-two percent of home Christmas tree structure fires occurred on the twelve days from December 23 through January 3.
  - During 2005-2009, an estimated 12,860 home structure fires started by candles were reported to local fire departments. These fires resulted in an estimated 136 civilian deaths, 1,041 civilian injuries and an estimated direct property loss of \$471 million.
  - ♦ Two of every five reported home fires start in the kitchen -- more than any other place in the home.

- Half of all home heating fires occurred in December, January and February in 2005-2009.
- Holiday or other decorative lights with line voltage were involved in an average of 150 home structure fires per year, resulting in an average of 8 civilian deaths, 14 civilian injuries, and \$8.5 million in direct property damage.

pipes for obstructions.

The TLHA appreciates the regular policing of the trash and debris along the shoreline, and I will help out as well during my inspections.

As a reminder, in order to keep the drainage into the lakes unobstructed and to reduce the organic matter decaying in the lakes, please do not let leaves accumulate in the drainage ditches or

rake leaves into the lake.

One final reminder - since the geese population in our neighborhood is an issue, please do not feed the geese.

#### **GET PREPARED FOR WINTER WEATHER — LOU LAFRENAYE**

Cooler temperatures are setting in, which means winter is on its way. Before winter weather hits our area, talk with your family about how to stay safe and take action to get prepared! Planning and preparing can help you manage the impact of severe winter weather.

The "How to Prepare for a Winter Storm" guide outlines steps you can take now, including:

- ⇒ Gather emergency supplies;
- ⇒ Make a family emergency communication plan;
- ⇒ Install battery-powered or battery back-up carbon monoxide detectors;
- ⇒ If you have access to an outside generator, have an electric cord long enough to keep the generator at

- least 20 feet from any door, window, or vent;
- ⇒ NEVER use a generator inside your home or in any partially enclosed area; and
- ⇒ Be alert to changing weather conditions using local alerts, batteryoperated radios, and other news sources for information and instructions.

Although we do not live in an area that gets significant amounts of snow, we do get ice storms which could leave us without power for several days. To learn more about preparing for winter weather, take a look at this animated video, and see what to do "When the Sky Turns Gray".


