YOUR HOME'S CRAWL SPACE — KEITH EBERT

Do You Know What Lurks Below?

Recently, my wife and I decided to have new hardwood flooring installed in our kitchen, eating area, dining room, living room, hallway, bathroom, and pantry. During the old flooring removal process, the contractor showed us water supply leak damage that affected the floors in the bathroom and pantry. After hiring a plumbing company, they discovered two pinhole leaks in a vertical copper tubing inside the pantry wall and four pinhole leaks in a horizontal copper tubing in the crawl space under the downstairs bathroom. The damage to the bathroom floor was so extensive that the bathroom HVAC register and ducting fell down into the crawl space when the old flooring was removed.

We then hired a crawl space company to come to our house to give us an estimate to repair the problems down below. After the estimator entered the crawl space to take numerous pictures, he came inside our house to show us what he discovered during his inspection. Besides showing us the picture of the copper tubing that had the four leaks, he showed us pictures of sub-floor damage, joist damage, and termite damage to three joists. Needless to say, my wife and I were both shocked to see the condition of our crawl space.

We are in the process of firing our current termite company (and hiring another) because we are very disappointed with them. Once a year, per our contract with them, one of their representatives comes to our house and enters the crawl space to inspect for any termite activity. My wife and I feel

we should have been told of any water leaks under the house. The water leak damage to the subfloors and joists did not occur within the last year; we were told that the damage started more than nine years ago. I would recommend that you hire a company to come to your home and show you pictures of your crawl space's current status. The company we hired did the inspection free of charge. It's better to find out what kind of shape your crawl space is in NOW before you put your house on the market. Bottomline: do you really know what lurks below in your crawl space?


⇒ Possibly two new Board members. At the annual meeting, these can be nominated and voted on. The particular office, i.e.

THE ABC'S OF BACK TO SCHOOL PREPAREDNESS



With school bells ringing across the Na-

tion, it is time for parents and guardians to get familiar with the emergency plan at your child's school or daycare.

Much like individuals and families, schools and day-care providers should all have site-specific emergency plans. If you are a parent or guardian, it is important to make sure your child's school or daycare has a plan to ensure his or her safety during an emergency.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) outline steps as easy as ABC

to keep your child safe at school or daycare:

- Ask how you will reunite with your child in an emergency or evacuation.
- Bring extra medication, special foods, or supplies that your child might need.
- Complete a <u>backpack contact information card.</u> Download a copy at https://www.cdc.gov/phpr/rea

EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS

Thursday, August 24, 2017, marked the sixth anniversary of the 2011 East Coast earthquake. While earthquakes may be more prevalent in some areas than others, they can happen anywhere and are unpredictable.

Taking steps ahead of time to protect yourself and your family in the event of an earthquake is vital in reducing injuries and loss of life. The vast majority of injuries during an earthquake occur because of flying glass and falling objects. Stay safe with these tips from "Prepareathon's How to Prepare for an Earthquake" guide. - ⇒ Prepare your home for an earthquake by securing all items that could fall and cause injuries (e.g. bookshelves, mirrors, light fixtures).
- ⇒ Practice how to Drop, Cover, and Hold On under a desk or table. Watch the "When the Earth Shakes" video at https://www.fema.gov/media-library/assets/videos/98767

for more information on what to do if an earthquake happens while you are inside, outside, or driving.

- ⇒ Plan how you will communicate with family members by making a family emergency communication plan.
- ⇒ When the shaking stops, look around. If there is a clear path to safety, leave the building and go to an open space away from any damage.

STORMWATER AND HURRICANE SEASON PREPAREDNESS

As we enter into the peak period of hurricane season (Sept-Oct), we ask everyone to help minimize any flooding situation in the neighborhood by keeping your property cleared of yard waste, leaves, branches, and debris and to secure any items that can float or blow away into our lakes.

During a major rain event, our lakes can rapidly fill up and potentially cause a flooding situation to homes if the outflow pipes and emergency spillway are blocked by debris. During one storm in 2006, our lakes rose 54" above normal level due to the amount of rain

we received.

To help prevent any blockage of our out-

flow area, we ask homeowners to keep your drainage ditches and swales clear of cut grass, leaves, branches, and debris. Check both in front and behind your homes. As an example, homes between Leslie Lane and Bridgewood Dr. have a swale in their back yard that drains into two grates. Several homes on the outer boundaries of Tabb Lakes have drainage ditches or swales behind their homes that should be checked. Homeowners who




live on the lake should properly secure any boats, outdoor chairs and tables that are

near the lakes. Prior to a major storm, remove anything that can float away and secure it up near your home. That includes logs and firewood that can be carried away by rising lake levels and block up our drainage pipes.

The best way to minimize flooding is to make sure our drainage system is working at full capacity. Your assistance and diligence can help keep it that way.
