runs our Beautification Committee. Angela and her group judge Yard of the Month and the Annual Holiday Decoration contests. A first-time volunteer, Neal VanHouten, will head up our Neighborhood Watch Program. Thanks to all of you!

I would like to see more homeowners volunteer. We still have a vacant Activities Committee and the Lake Two Management position; consider volunteering for these positions.

During 2018, the Board and Committees have accomplished the following tasks: the dredging of Lake 1, donation to support the Neighborhood Block Party, successfully averted an effort to build an-

other business on Route 17 that would have threatened Lake 1 with more runoff and debris, coordinated with York County to migrate noise and block unsightly junked cars from view, upgraded several street signs, updated the membership on the new process for reporting watch light outages to Dominion Energy, revised ARC request form to include a postconstruction visit to ensure project is completed in accordance with approved specifications, and improved insurance coverage to protect the Association from liability.

Finally, the Tabb Lakes Homeowner's Association Board exists to serve our community and to ensure the Covenants are enforced to keep our neighborhood an attractive real estate investment that will attract new home buyers and allow future home sellers to receive top dollar for their home. In 2018, 26 homes sold an average 5.6% above the assessed value. Thank you to all the residents that constantly maintain your property to our Covenant standards.

PREPARING FOR WINTER SAFETY — LOU LAFRENAYE

Winter storms and extreme cold create a higher risk of car accidents, hypothermia, frost-bite, carbon monoxide poisoning, and heart attacks from overexertion. Winter storms can knock out power, heat, and communication services and place you and your family at greater risk. FEMA, CDC, and DHS advise families to take prudent precautions to minimize the risks of severe winter weather.

Home safety:

- ♦ Test your smoke and CO2 alarms once a month.
- ♦ Check that you have smoke alarms on every level of your home, including the basement. Be sure to have alarms close to where people are sleeping, especially if you are hosting guests for the upcoming holidays.

- Never use an oven or stovetop to heat your home in the winter.
- Never leave a burning candle unattended.
- If you use a portable heating device (electrical or kerosene) in your home, read and carefully follow the instructions and safety protocols.
- Have supplies ready at home in case you ever lose power. Keep in mind your family's needs such as medication. Don't forget about food and supplies for pets.

If you are driving distances during the winter season:

Know the weather conditions for the length of your route. Stay informed and updated on pending weather changes.

- Insure your automobile is properly winterized, serviced, and prepared for winter weather travel.
- ◆ Keep an emergency kit in your car. Include jumper cables, warm clothes, bottled water and snacks, first aid kit, flashlight, a spare cell phone charger, and an ice scraper.

YORK COUNTY CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION



Beginning November 26 and continuing through February 9th, residents may place an

unlimited number of clear bags of leaves at the front roadside for collection every other week. Our zone includes these dates:

- December 10 and 24
- January 7 and 21
- February 4 (Final Sweep)

In order to ensure collection, bags must be at the front roadside by **7 a.m. on the Monday of your collection** week. Pick up will be completed by the end of the week. The following rules apply:

- Bags must not exceed 40 lbs. in weight.
- Only clear bags are collected and must not have drawstrings. Bags must be no thicker than one millimeter.
- Bags containing other yard debris (sticks, etc.) and/or

pet waste will not be accepted

York County participates in a regional de-bagging operation performed at the VPPSA Compost Facility. Please help us with this program by purchasing clear bags no thicker than one millimeter and without drawstrings.

BE FIRE-SAFE THIS HOLIDAY SEASON — LOU LAFRENAYE



Please use these tips to keep your home and family fire-safe during the upcoming holiday season:

- ⇒ Always turn holiday lights off before leaving home or going to bed.
- ⇒ If you have a Christmas tree, water it daily. A dry tree can catch on fire easily. Keep it at least 3 feet away from heat sources.
- ⇒ Keep candles 12 inches away from anything that

can burn. Consider using flameless candles for all or part of Christmas, Hanukkah, or Kwanzaa celebrations.

The U.S Fire Administration provided these facts below to help increase awareness of holiday fires in our community.

- ⇒ One of every four home Christmas tree fires is caused by electrical problems.
- ⇒ Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious. On average, one of every 32 reported home Christmas tree fires results.

- in a death compared to an average of one death per 143 total reported home fires.
- ⇒ A heat source too close to the tree causes one in every four Christmas tree fires.
- ⇒ The top three days for home candle fires are Christmas, New Year's Day, and Christmas Eve.
- ⇒ Candles start two out of five home decoration structure fires.

KEEP YOUR HOME SECURE

Deputy Shawn Dearhart, a member of the Crime Prevention Unit in the York-Poquoson Sheriff's Office, recently presented a briefing on securing your home and property. She stated that the first and easiest thing to do is to lock your doors! Some homeowners either do not, or forget to, lock their doors when they depart their home or go to sleep. She said that, historically, doors are the first choice of entry for burglars. Also, remember to lock the individual access

door on the side of the garage, secure your windows, and lock your vehicles (to prevent access to your garage door opener).

Deputy Dearhart also described what is known as the 6 second break-in. A burglar can break into your garage within 6 seconds by using a coat hanger and reaching inside the garage to pull the emergency cord/garage safety latch on the garage door opener. This will allow them to open the garage door. The video she used in her presentation to show the pro-


second break-in". One way you can negate this method of access is by securing the garage safety latch with a small zip-tie. Examples of how to do this can be found on line.
